

1908 was a year of great expansion in the US. It was also a year of unrest. The oppression of women encouraged women to become vocal about disparity and inequality. A campaign for change rallied 15,000 women to march the streets in New York protesting for shorter hours, better pay and voting rights.

The next year the Socialist Party of America announced a National Women's Day to honor the movement, and in 1910 it went global – the Socialist International voted for the creation of a Women's Day to advocate for suffrage. The first International Women's Day was held in 1911, and more than a million people turned out to rallies in Europe.

For most of the 20th century International Women's Day was acknowledged and celebrated by people at the grassroots level, a rallying point for social justice. In 1975 International Women's Day was celebrated for the first time by the United Nations. Then in December of 1977, the General Assembly adopted a resolution proclaiming a United Nations Day for Women's Rights and International Peace.

By the year 2000, very little activity was occurring for International Women's Day. The world had moved on and feminism wasn't a popular topic. A spark was needed to re-ignite International Women's Day, and to raise awareness amongst the masses. There is still much work to be done.

President Barack Obama proclaimed March 2011 to be "Women's History Month", calling Americans to mark the event by reflecting on "*the extraordinary* accomplishments of women" in shaping the country's history. Hillary Clinton launched the "100 Women Initiative: Empowering Women and Girls through International Exchanges".

The 2021 IWD theme is **#choosetochallenge**. A challenged world is an alert world. Individually, we are responsible for our own thoughts and actions. BUT...We can choose to challenge and call out gender bias and inequity. We can choose to seek out and celebrate women's achievements. Collectively, we can all help create an inclusive world. We can honor the women who went before us in 1908. We can honor their efforts by carrying on the mission they began.

On <u>March 8, 2021</u>, International Women's Day (IWD) will be celebrated as one of the most important days of the year for us to:

- celebrate women's achievements
- raise awareness about equality
- lobby for accelerated gender parity
- fundraise for female-focused charities
